- Bantam AA/Junior Little League partnership was another key component that is offered to encourage more players to participate and continue the legacy of hosting the National Junior tournament in Lethbridge each year

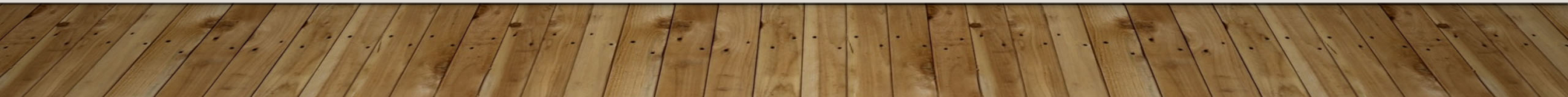

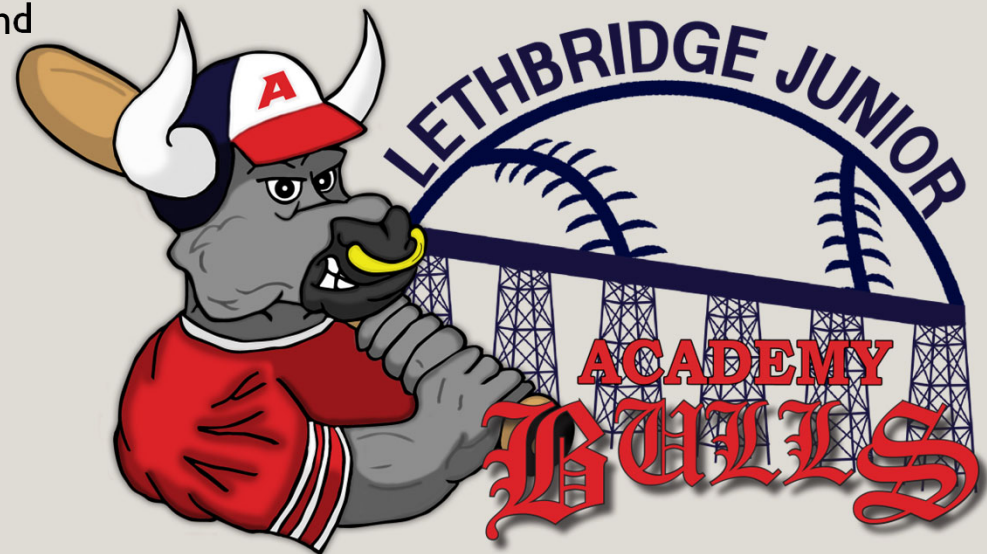

MISSION STATEMENT

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WHY WAS JUNIOR ACADEMY FORMED

- Little League in Canada has short seasons and lacks quality competition throughout the entirety of the season.
- To give the elite players in Lethbridge and area more opportunity to play against high calibre opponents, win or lose
- 11 years ago we decided that the younger players needed more opportunity to play high level baseball earlier in the Spring
- The goal from the coaches back then was give the players a legitimate opportunity to play in the Little League World Series

WHY IT WAS FORMED OUTSIDE OF LITTLE LEAGUE

- PBA and the Bulls worked together to create the Junior Academy and provide their name and vision to the program. They give the management of the program to the LDIBF, which oversees the program, provided their vision, mission, and messaging is adhered to.
- Vested interest by the Board which is made up of Bulls, Prairie Baseball Academy, and other long-term baseball persons
- Coaches who are asked to follow the culture of the program and who want to see success & skill development at younger ages
- Program culture designed to mirror that of the Prairie Baseball Academy
- Program goals which align and give players interactive opportunities to see baseball at the highest levels in the city, ie with the Lethbridge Bulls and Prairie Baseball
- Coaches resources provided when available

PROGRAM CULTURE & PRINCIPLES

- We are trying to create a culture similar to college programs, especially Prairie Baseball, throughout all the age groups
- Blue Collar - Hard working
- 8 seconds on 8 seconds off
- Winning is very important to any culture but winning does not take precedence over program/player development or player health

JUNIOR ACADEMY SCHEDULE & COSTS

- Tryouts – January 26 – 28, 2024 (Two per Team Selection Group)
- Training Camps – Family Day weekend
- Spring Baseball – Schedules determined by coaches in consultation with parent group – usually 3-4 tournaments plus practices and exhibition games
- Summer Baseball – Players in Little League programming is expected
- Fall Baseball (if desired)
- Total Cost with 3 tournaments is about \$320-\$350 plus a \$300 fundraising fee. This covers all costs, practices, games, apparel, coaching, facilities, entry fees, etc.

WHY WE STARTED

- We felt that there was a void for high school aged players who wanted a chance to develop year-round for a chance to become college baseball players.

- **Chris Leroux**

- My son Dawson Leroux grew up playing hockey and baseball for many years in conjunction with each other. During the hockey season Dawson would attend the PBA skill sessions held during the week. It was a busy schedule for many years, but the cross training was beneficial (training different muscles / training the brain with another sport / moving the body differently / being around a different set of coaches and friends / different types of environments you put the body in / spatial awareness / etc, etc.
- As parents we just managed the workload and made sure there was no potential burn out.
- These skill session's exposed Dawson to a higher level of baseball training, hitting / pitching / fielding / etc - and Dawson had fun at these sessions because they were challenging, and it pushed him.
- As the hockey season ended and the baseball spring season approached Dawson played on the PBA Dawgs travel team. This was an elite / high performance stream that we chose to play. From a very young age Dawson experienced spring baseball. This became important to Dawson / us because we knew it was a competitive program that would challenge the players.
- Being a multi-sport athlete has so many benefits for the athlete, and there is actual scientific data behind it. Dawson also played other sports as well during the year at school. We did not allow Dawson to play Spring hockey because it's a long hockey season and changing the environment was needed mentally and physically.
- The higher level of coaching and training had many benefits to Dawson as a baseball player / athlete. Furthermore, the extensive travel and game competition was great for Dawson as an athlete because we played against very good competition most of the time. Playing against a higher competition level can increase your chance of becoming a better baseball player and athlete. Things at a higher level are faster, quicker, more challenging, your brain needs to react in different ways, more situations can occur that need you to adapt.
- Playing in a high-performance area created many successes and failures for Dawson. This built mental toughness, increased confidence, developed fundamental and sport specific skills that carry over in any sport. At the time the travel seemed extensive but looking back on it know we But I would suggest that Dawson's baseball experience enhanced his hockey abilities and made him a better person and athlete. --



- **Matt Kabayama**

- I would be considered a “hockey guy”. My perspective is from a dad who grew up playing hockey and baseball. Hockey became my passion, and I was involved professionally in the game for more than 20 years.
- Our experience dealing with our son was which sport to specialize and at what age.
- Hockey or Baseball.
- When hockey season finished baseball started and when baseball finished hockey started. There was some overlap depending on how far the team went into provincials, nationals, or worlds.
- We chose to focus almost exclusively on the sport which was in “season”. Some teammates were exclusively baseball players and some were multi sport but continued to play and train for hockey during ball season. The parents and coaches communicated, they understood there were consequences if you chose to participate in one vs the other when there was a conflict of schedules.
- His age group was fortunate to have multi sport kids and parents who wanted to expose their kids to elite level sports and competition. Looking back, if he specialized at age 10 we would have likely chosen hockey (He actually didn’t play organized baseball until he was 9). We would have missed out on many memorable experiences.

I left a disciplined, charismatic and determined young man. This program believed in me first and guided me to have fun, build character, create interpersonal skills, have respect and most importantly possess all of these attributes into my everyday life. The Jr. Dawgs Program will be a part of my youth but the people, relationships and accomplishments we created along the way will last a lifetime.
